

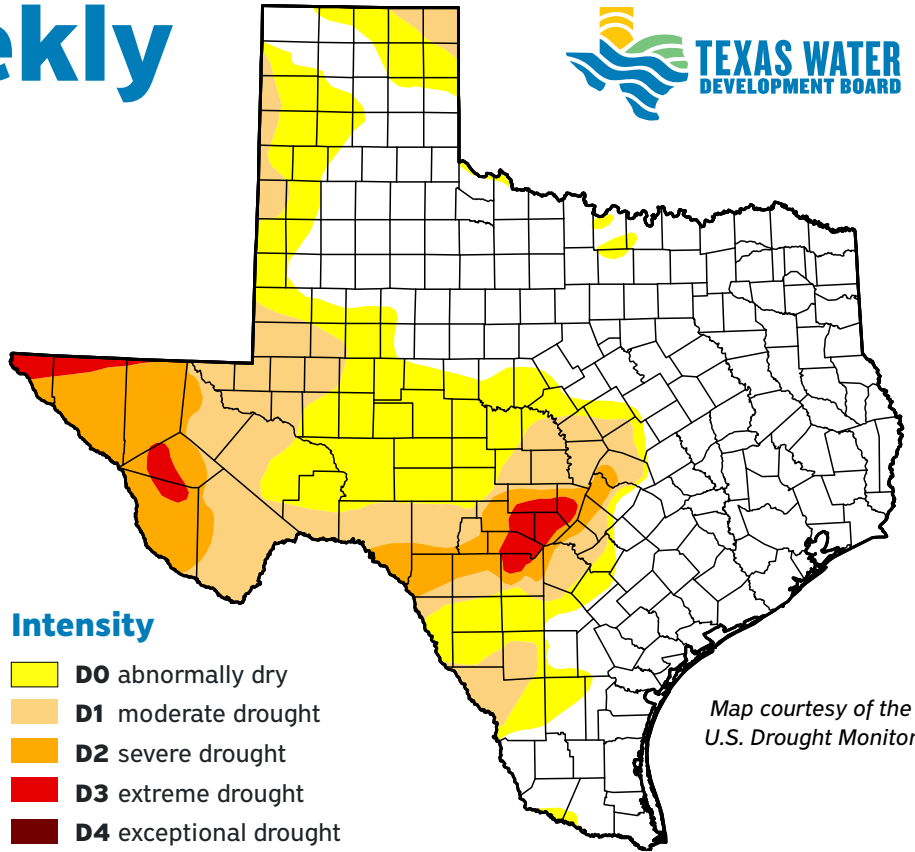
# Water Weekly

## Water conditions

The latest drought map for conditions as of April 9 shows a less than one percentage point increase in the area of the state impacted by drought. In the last week, the last area of abnormally dry conditions (shown in yellow on the map) disappeared from East Texas.

**25%** now

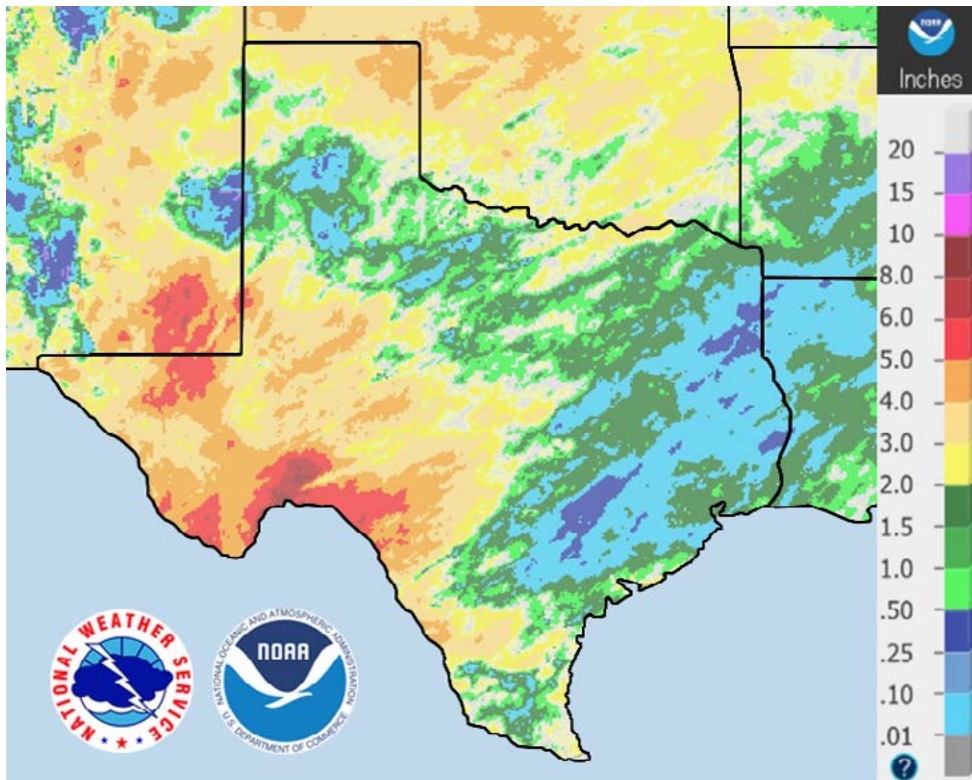
**25%** a week ago

## 2024 precipitation

Since the first of the year, precipitation has been near or above normal for most of the eastern half of the state, leading to drought relief in those areas. Large areas of the Panhandle and Central and West Texas, however, have received well below-normal precipitation. Drought continues to linger in those areas.
